Exciting Wadars News

Since relocating to our premises on Hangleton Lane in Ferring in 2015, we have continued to provide vital services for local animals and the wider community. However, despite the size of our 15 acre site, we have not been able to develop it in the way originally planned. Changes in funding landscapes, community expectations, and broader societal shifts have made it increasingly difficult to unlock the site's full potential.

With this in mind, the Board of Trustees has undertaken a careful and thorough review of our services and the needs of the community we serve. Their conclusion is that seeking new, more suitable premises will place the charity in the strongest possible position for the future. A new site will allow us to continue delivering our charitable work effectively and sustainably, while ensuring we can grow and adapt in the years ahead.

We have obtained two independent valuations of the current site and have instructed local agents, James & James, to place the property on the market. While we assess interest, we will also be actively searching for a new location within our catchment area of Worthing and the surrounding areas.

In our last issue we appealed for donations towards the cost of running our community wildlife service after our legacy income had taken a big dip. We would like to say a huge thank you to all supporters who contributed to the appeal and reassure everyone that whilst we continue to need to generate more income the immediate future of Wadars is secure.

Just one of our recent wildlife rescues



Following a number of calls to our wildlife helpline regarding a bird of prey that was seen just sitting in the school playing fields at Angmering School, Animal Rescue Officer Matt was sent to check out the situation.

The bird turned out to be a buzzard and appeared weak and underweight so was taken to a nearby vet for initial treatment. The following day we transported the buzzard to a local wildlife hospital for rehabilitation where it remained until it was strong enough to be released back into the wild.

Our wildlife helpline dealt with more than 2,400 calls about sick and injured wildlife during 2025.

Why transporting your cat in a secure cat basket is a must

There are many different types of cat carry baskets available on the market and we are often asked why we insist on certain types being used when people are adopting cats from us or bringing them in to be rehomed.

This came into sharp focus recently when a lady brought her cat to us for rehoming in a sturdy cardboard box which had been tied down on the top. After signing the cat into our care the lady left the Centre and our animal welfare staff carefully opened the box to transfer the cat to a secure basket.

The staff member was shocked to find that there was no cat in the box and immediately called the lady, who had already left the car park, to let her know. The lady returned to the Centre with the cat who had escaped from the box and was by then loose in the car.

The cat was eventually transferred into one of our baskets and taken to the cattery so everything worked ok in the end, but if the cat had escaped in our car park it would almost definitely have run off and been very difficult to trace as it was not used to the area.

Whenever transporting a cat always ensure that the carrier you are using is secure, and the cat cannot escape.

The true cost of caring

We are often asked why we charge a set fee for our animals rather than asking for a donation. The answer is simply that we already run at a substantial loss when rehoming pets and cannot afford to drop our fees.

The actual cost to Wadars of taking in, health-checking, neutering where necessary, treating for fleas and worms, microchipping where appropriate and then caring for the animal until it can be found a new home (which is on average at least one month) can be more than £900 for a large dog, £520 for a cat, and £400-£500 for a rabbit.

Our minimum adoption fees for 2026 are as follows:

- Puppies up to six months old - £300
- Adult dogs - £280
- Kittens up to six months old - £130
- Adult cats - £110
- Rabbits - £50 for a single; £80 for a pair
- Guinea Pigs - £35 for a single; £55 for a pair

As you can see there is quite a difference between the fee and the actual costs involved and we are always extremely grateful for any additional donations on top of the minimum fees.

Slots still available for corporate volunteers

A kitten-tastic year!



Our cattery maternity unit was certainly put to very good use throughout 2025 with almost 50 kittens and their mums passing through its doors.

Having kittens in our care is always a very costly business and can cost hundreds of pounds per kitten during their time with us.

In addition to them spending far longer in our care than many adult cats do, and therefore once they have been weaned from mum costing more in feed and litter, every single

one has to be vaccinated, neutered and treated for fleas and worms - costs that we don't necessarily always have with all adult cats.

Not vaccinating your puppy could be a death sentence

We have recently learned about several cases locally of puppies becoming extremely ill after contracting Canine Parvovirus.

Parvo as it is known is a highly contagious disease which can be fatal, especially in puppies and unvaccinated dogs. Symptoms of Parvo include severe foul smelling bloody diarrhoea, vomiting, lethargy and sudden death.

While vaccination isn't a 100% guarantee that your dog won't catch it, it is the best protection that they can have from the disease.

Could you provide a foster home for guinea pigs in need?

In addition to caring for animals at our Rehoming Centre we also have some that ideally need to be in short term foster homes.

We are currently looking for indoor foster homes for guinea pigs.

Wadars provides everything that the fosterer might need to look after an animal until it can be rehomed and while previous experience of owning guinea pigs isn't essential and full training will be given, it would be helpful to have some prior knowledge.
